Long-serving local councillor Paul Holbrook has been voted to serve as Town Mayor and Chairman at the Annual Meeting of the Town Council held at the James West Community

Centre on Wednesday 17th May.

The Annual Meeting also elected Councillor Cllr Anne Marie Ricketts as Deputy Town Mayor and Vice-Chairman, as well as various representatives for local community organisations. On accepting the chain of office, Councillor Holbrook, representing Hailsham Central Ward, said that his long-term vision is for a town that is community-driven and stated that it will be another busy year ahead for the Town Council.

"As Town Mayor and Chairman for another term, I look forward to continuing in my contribution to the Council's future achievements, including continuing to work hard for our residents to make further significant improvements to our services, finding more efficient ways to carry out our activities and make front-line operations as efficient as possible."

"As we all know, due to the cost-of-living crisis, a number of key changes have affected the Town Council, and we have all had to work hard - and under greater constraint than usual. 

"There are several organisations which are independent from the Town Council but have an impact on its service areas and benefit from maintaining effective partnerships with us," said Town Clerk John Harrison. "Town Council representatives attend as many meetings of an outside body as they are reasonably able and, at these meetings, allows the organisation to gain access to the expertise and knowledge of the Council - and also help to make sure that the Council is kept up to date with the actions and future plans of the organisation."



### JAMES WEST COMMUNITY CENTRE: FIVE YEARS AS ASSET TO THE COMMUNITY

The James West Community Centre will celebrate five years this summer since it first launched and opened to the public in 2018.

A valuable asset to the local community, the centre, located in Brunel Drive in north Hailsham, currently has a wide range of local groups and people of all ages using the space and facilities on a regular basis.

The provision of a community hall and sports facility was made as part of the initial planning agreement between Hailsham Town Council and Welbury Farm developer Taylor Wimpey in 2018 and has since become an integral part of the local community for people to socialise, stay fit and take part in various activities.

"Over the last five years, the James West Community Centre has been on quite a journey," said Deputy Town Clerk & Business Enterprise Manager, Mickey Caira. "The centre has played host to sports training sessions and tournaments, wellness workshops, keep fit classes and more - even baby ballet classes!"

"Since opening, this purpose-built centre has already begun to play a key role in enabling Hailsham to fulfil its potential as a vibrant and inclusive town. I'm delighted that the centre has had a good first five years with the different groups and services working together to provide a high-quality facility for local people and has become such a positive asset to Hailsham."

The Centre consists of an 18m x 11.7m hall, able to accommodate an audience of around 200 seated, in addition to two meeting rooms. The facility also includes a modern kitchen, storerooms, toilets, changing rooms and a P.A. system.

Hirers can use the James West Community Centre for social clubs and activities, sports and games, dancing and exercise, pre-school and toddler groups, craft exhibits,





after-school clubs, family functions, quiz nights and fundraising events, as well as seminars, conferences, business meetings and public consultation events.

Current regular hirers include Hailsham Table Tennis Club, Monday Youth Hub, Hailsham Active, Hailsham Voices Pop Choir, FLexercise, Elements Yoga, PW Performers and Baby Ballet. The centre also hosts meetings provided by the AA (Alcoholics Anonymous) and Hailsham Parkinsons Society.

A BOOM FOR HAILSHAM RESIDENTS

The Town Council is taking action to raise awareness of the availability of post office banking services for residents and businesses, as more bank branches close nationally and a recent survey highlights the continued preference for in-person banking by many people.

According to a survey conducted by professional services company Accenture in March, around a third of people would rather carry out all their banking in person and many people still prefer to attend their local bank branch in person to obtain financial advice and financial services amid cost-of-living pressures, despite increasingly being able to access them online.

Although over 40% of people aged 55 and over would rather visit a branch in-person, the survey of more than 2,400 banking customers concluded that it is not just the older generations who are reluctant to switch to mobile or online banking. Around 20% of 18 to 34-year-olds stated that they prefer to carry out their banking in person according to the survey.

Interestingly, more cash was handled by the Post Office in March than any month since last September (excluding Christmas) and recent figures showed cash deposits and withdrawals over the counter reached well over £3 billion during March, across its 11,500 branches.

People are increasingly accessing their local post office to manage money due to some banks closing branches, which, in some towns, can make it "the only location where consumers can do their banking," the survey stated.

The Town Council wishes to assure residents that normal bank transactions can be carried out in branch at the town centre Post Office located at 10 High Street, including business deposits.

Residents can access their high street bank accounts at the post office - this service is free of charge and, provided customers have their debit card with them, they can check your balance and withdraw or deposit cash. If you don't have a debit card, some banks will still allow you to deposit cash via the Post Office, if you have a deposit slip.

The Post Office's free everyday banking service is available to both businesses and individuals.

"An increasing number of people bank online and consequently make far fewer visits to branches," said John Harrison, Town Clerk and Postmaster of the Hailsham High Street Post Office. "Whilst we fully understand the considerable uptake in the use of online banking in recent years, there is still a significant number of people, particularly the elderly, who like to visit their branches and bank in person."

"This is where we continue to help, with transactions for customers of other banks and building societies too.

# ADDITIONAL BURIAL SPACE TO BE CREATED AT CEMETERY

Work will get under way on further improvements to Hailsham Cemetery with the refurbishment of the Old Garden of Remembrance and creation of additional ashes burial plots, scheduled to commence soon.

Following recent discussions by the Assets Management Committee, councillors agreed to refurbish the Old Garden of Remembrance area of the cemetery in Ersham Road, work which will include the removal of the existing beech perimeter hedge which has caused problems in the past due to heavy leaf drop.

All existing paths in the area will be re-laid using existing materials and the area of grass in the middle of the garden will be removed and offered to the community as new ashes interment plots. The burial area gained will release up to 100 ashes plots.

"Hailsham Cemetery is a quiet, secluded burial ground run by the Town Council and maintained for maximum peace for those visiting loved ones," said Town Clerk, John Harrison. "We



want to ensure that our cemetery provides a fitting and appropriate place for people to visit their loved ones which is why we continue make improvements by carrying out any upgrades and repair work necessary on site. By doing this, we can ensure that the cemetery remains a place the community can be truly proud of."

"The refurbishment of the Old Garden of Remembrance will go a considerable way in terms of providing additional interment space for the local community."



# WORK COMPLETED ON PLAY AREA UPGRADES

Major work has finished on improvements to some of the town's children's play areas, delivering an exciting upgrade to play equipment.

With the success of the upgraded play area in Western Road, the Town Council has taken this opportunity to bring the playground located on the Maurice Thornton Playing Field in addition to those located in Stroma Gardens and Battle Road up to optimum standard, offering excellent play value for all users.

The project has been funded by using the Council's Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money and will future proof the play areas for the next 10-15 years.

The upgrade to the Maurice Thornton Playing Field play area saw the installation of a 30-metre aerial zipwire, replacement of the broken inclusive roundabout and complete overlaying of the wet-pour in the area.

Work was also carried out on the play area situated in Stroma Gardens and included the installation of new pieces of toddler equipment, as well as the removal of the large slide and replacement with a toddler multi-play unit. A 4-person springy seesaw and inclusive toddler springy was also installed.

The third phase of the project, which is nearing completion at the time of writing, sees the replacement of swings on the Battle Road play area, in addition to the replacement of the Whirly Bird roundabout with an inclusive one and complete overlaying of the wet-pour surface.

"The revamp of some of our play areas is part of the Town Council's continued commitment to improve local parks and open spaces," said Works Manager Richard Gillett. "The Town Council's play areas strike a balance between providing play and meeting current safety requirements, which is why we pride ourselves in maintaining our facilities to the highest standards and undertaking regular inspections, repairs and replacements where necessary, as well as upgrades such as these."





"The Battle Road, Stroma Gardens and Maurice Thornton play facilities are well-used, and the improvement works to these sites will see the installation of new and more inclusive equipment - plus it will also help the Town Council tackle the challenge of a growing number of families with children in the Hailsham area."

In addition to Battle Road, Stroma Gardens and Maurice Thornton, the Town Council currently manages play areas in Western Road and Quinnell Drive, plus two outdoor gym sites and a children's skate park.





Commencing in Hailsham High Street in the morning, the route followed along through Bell Banks Road, Station Road, Old Swan Lane, Mill Road, Archery Walk, St Mary's Avenue and Marshfoot Lane, before finishing back on the High Street in the early afternoon.

Whilst the main sponsor of the run was the Town Council, sponsorship was also raised from businesses in the community, funds of which went towards the event's overall expenses.

"We are delighted to have co-organised the event and contributed to its resounding success, complementing our mission to create a healthier Hailsham community," said town councillor and Hailsham Active representative, Mary Laxton. "The success of the event further demonstrates our objectives to help make Hailsham fully inclusive as a community and it was pleasing to see residents with any form of disability or special need participating in the 1-mile inclusive run especially."

Cllr Laxton added: "The event took two years to organise and come together, will help put Hailsham on the sporting map and hopefully become annual event in the town which everyone can look forward to."

"Once again, a big thank you to everyone who lined the route and cheered runners on at the start and finish line to show their support. It was wonderful to see so many people, from fun runners to the more serious athletes, really enjoying themselves and making such a fantastic effort!"

### ENJOY HAILSHAM COUNTRY PARK

### DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS

Do you enjoy the outside life? The Town Council has launched another campaign to encourage residents to visit Hailsham Country Park and enjoy the beauty of the upcoming spring season.

The Council-maintained Country Park, situated off Gleneagles Drive, covers approximately 22 acres and incorporates woodland, a recreational grass area, two ponds and a lake. A water course skirts the open field area and all-weather footpaths can be found throughout the park to encourage people of all ages to enjoy this precious open space area.

"Offering a peaceful and relaxing environment and with so much to offer, the Country Park is an ideal place to get away from it all," said Karen Giddings, Environment & Planning Officer at Hailsham Town Council.

"Residents and visitors can bring their family and a picnic, do a spot of fishing at the Gleneagles lake, jog, spot wildlife, exercise their dog or encourage their children to let off steam using the open space to have a run around!"

Hailsham Town Council is proud of its many improvements to the site in recent years, including the construction of a new path around Wentworth Pond and other area-specific projects such as the more upgrading and resurfacing of the pathway around the lake, making it more accessible for disabled users. Additionally, the Town Council has planted additional trees at the Country Park, as part of a plan to implement its environmental objectives over the course of the next few years.

The park's high level of maintenance by Town Council works staff, together with regular monitoring of the area by two Water Bailiffs, has ensured that the site remains a safe and clean public green space for the whole community to enjoy.





## TOWN CENTRE RETAIL UNIT VACANCIES: LATEST FIGURES

Latest figures show that Hailsham town centre falls well below the current regional and national averages of vacant ground floor commercial units.

According to a recent vacancy rate survey conducted by Springboard, the percentage of vacant ground floor units in Hailsham currently stands at 6.7%, recorded in April 2023. This also compares to a current regional/Southeast average of 9.9% and national average of 11%.

During the past few years, the town centre has welcomed a range of new businesses, including those which have expanded and subsequently relocated to larger premises and retail spaces.

Deputy Town Clerk and Business Enterprise Manager Mickey Caira said: "The percentage of vacant commercial units in Hailsham has decreased considerably in recent years and still falls below the current regional and national averages, which is excellent news for Hailsham. Hailsham is definitely the place to be for all shopping needs."

"The Town Council and Hailsham Forward have key priorities to work with local businesses to deliver plans to help address the issue of empty shops further and work towards a 100% occupancy rate for retail and business units."
