### Town Council Agrees to Adopt Land in North Hailsham



The Town Council is moving forward with plans to adopt land adjacent to the James West Community Centre in north Hailsham, following discussions by councillors at a meeting held on Wednesday 24th September.

At the meeting, members considered a range of options regarding the future of the Welbury Meadows land and resolved that the land be formally adopted by the Town Council. The recommendation is conditional on the successful transfer of the land from developers Taylor Wimpey and receipt of a commuted sum payment, as set out in the Section 106 agreement, within three months.

Once complete, the Town Council will launch a public consultation to gather views from residents on how the space should be used. Councillors have already begun preliminary discussions on the potential future uses of the land and are committed to working closely with the community to determine the best outcome for residents.

Assets Management Committee Chair, Cllr Mary Laxton, said: "This is a significant step forward and shows the Council's commitment to securing valuable assets for the long-term benefit of the community. Once the land transfer is finalised, we will be in a strong position to work with residents to shape a space that truly meets local needs."



## Meeting Rooms Available for the Community to Hire



Residents and community groups are reminded that the Town Council building in Market Street houses two meeting spaces available for hire: the Fleur de Lys Meeting Room and the Members' Room.

Both rooms can be booked for regular activities or one-off occasions, providing flexible facilities to suit a range of needs.

Operations and Facilities Manager Tony Lee commented: "Both meeting rooms are centrally located and affordable, serving as welcoming venues for local groups and public sector bodies."

## Updated Opening Hours for Vicarage Field Public Toilets



The opening hours for the Vicarage Field public toilet facility have recently changed to:

• Monday to Saturday: 8am-4pm

• Sunday: 10am-4pm

The Council continues to provide modern, fully accessible and free-to-use facilities following the recent reopening, which included repairs and the installation of replacement doors to address previous vandalism and damage.

First opened in March 2024 and funded through Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) contributions, the

facility represents a significant investment in the town centre. Key features include two modular public conveniences open to all users and a Changing Places facility for people with multiple or complex disabilities - equipped with an electronic hoist, rise-and-fall changing table, shower, toilet and accessible wash basin (RADAR key required).

Residents have already praised the toilets for their cleanliness, accessibility, and modern design. One local resident said: "The new facilities are spotless, spacious, warm and inviting. I've never seen such clean and spacious public toilets on my travels – a massive well done and thank you. The Council should be proud of this excellent facility, which is a real investment in Hailsham."

The Council reminds the public that incidents of vandalism and damage - including broken fixtures - have occurred in recent months, but these issues have now been resolved. ## Town Council Launches Online Graffiti Reporting System



The Town Council is strengthening its campaign against graffiti and vandalism and is calling on residents to play a proactive role in keeping the town's public spaces clean, safe and welcoming. Residents are now being encouraged to report incidents promptly and directly to Sussex Police, as well as notify the Council itself.

While the Town Council's maintenance team responds quickly to remove graffiti and repair damage, by reporting problems as soon as they happen, residents can make a vital difference in preventing further damage and holding offenders to account.

To simplify the reporting process, the Council has set up an

online form where residents can submit details of graffiti, vandalism, or other damage to council property. The information gathered will help the Council coordinate swift responses and work more effectively with Sussex Police to deter further incidents.

QR code stickers have been placed on Town Council property - including bus shelters, noticeboards and community buildings - giving residents quick access to the reporting form via their mobile phones.

Assets Management Committee Chair, Cllr Mary Laxton said: "We are appalled by the recent vandalism at facilities maintained for residents. These spaces are used daily by our community, and such anti-social behaviour and criminal damage is completely unacceptable. If anyone has information about recent or future incidents - or witnesses any suspicious activity on Town Council land - we urge them to contact Sussex Police without delay."

## Further Improvements in Progress at Hailsham Cemetery



The latest phase of improvements is underway at Hailsham Cemetery in Ersham Road, building on a series of significant upgrades carried out in recent years.

Works include the installation of a Book of Remembrance inside the cemetery chapel, the conversion of an existing building into a waiting room for visitors, and the display of the historic chapel bell in a custom-made glass cabinet.

Earlier this year, the Council completed resurfacing all footpaths at the cemetery, significantly improving safety and accessibility for visitors. Additionally, the public toilet facility on site underwent a comprehensive refurbishment,

which included internal upgrades, tile repairs and the replacement of soffits, gutters and downpipes. The updated toilet is now fully accessible, ensuring that all visitors have access to clean and suitable facilities.

In addition to these upgrades, grass cutting at the cemetery has been brought in-house, with Council staff handling the work previously done by external contractors. This change provides long-term cost savings while ensuring consistent standards of care.

"We are thrilled to continue enhancing Hailsham Cemetery with these upcoming improvements," said Cllr Mary Laxton, Chair of the Assets Management Committee. "The footpath resurfacing, along with the refurbishment of the public toilet, has already made a big difference to the site. Now, we're focusing on adding more meaningful and practical upgrades. The Book of Remembrance, waiting room and bell display will not only preserve the cemetery's history but will also offer a more respectful and comfortable space for those visiting their loved ones."





## Further Upgrades at the Maurice Thornton Playing Field



The Town Council has carried out a series of major access and facility improvements at the Maurice Thornton Playing Field, reinforcing its commitment to maintaining public recreational areas to the highest standard for residents, local sports clubs and the wider community.

Recently completed works have included the creation of a new vehicle crossover on Marshfoot Lane and installation of a vehicle access gate, designed to improve entry to the site for both maintenance purposes and community use.

In addition, the Council has continued its programme of playground upgrades and further investment has been

made at the Tony Tack Memorial Skate Park, where the Town Council has extended sections of the facility, repaired concrete surfaces and enhanced overall safety and usability for both skaters and BMX riders.

Assets Management Committee Chair, Cllr Mary Laxton said: "The Maurice Thornton Playing Field is a vital recreational hub for our town, and the Council is proud to have delivered such a wide range of improvements for residents and local sports clubs. From new playground equipment to skate park upgrades and the most recently completed access improvements, these investments reflect our commitment to providing safe, modern and enjoyable spaces that benefit the whole community."



## Pride Taken in Maintaining Hailsham Country Park



The Town Council is committed to ensuring that the Hailsham Country Park, a cherished green space located off Gleneagles Drive, remains a well-maintained, safe and accessible area for the entire community.

Covering approximately 22 acres, the park features a combination of woodland, recreational grass areas, two ponds and a lake. It also boasts a watercourse that borders the open field area, as well as a network of all-weather footpaths designed to encourage outdoor activity for people of all ages.

With this commitment in mind, the Town Council is pleased to announce that it has recently carried out much-needed fence repairs

around the park. This essential work will help maintain the park's integrity and safety, ensuring that both residents and visitors can continue to enjoy this peaceful green space without concern.

The Town Council is delighted to announce the completion of the latest stage of improvement works to its Market Street office building, The Inglenook, with the repainting of the front exterior now finished.


The work included painting and tidying the frontage, including window frames, and has given the historic Grade II listed building a refreshed and welcoming appearance.

As part of its commitment to listening to the views of the public and taking these into account in its decision-making processes, the Town Council is issuing information on public attendance at meetings.





## Registration Open for 2026 Hailsham Community Run



Following the success of this year's Hailsham Community Run, which was part-sponsored by the Town Council, organisers are pleased to announce that registration for the 2026 event is now officially open.

The run, which takes place on Sunday 17th May 2026, is set to be bigger than ever, welcoming runners and walkers of all ages and abilities.

Building on the momentum of 2025's record-breaking event - which saw over 1,000 participants across the 10k, 5k, 3k and fully inclusive 1-

mile routes - organisers are now aiming for 1,200 entries. With the popularity of the run growing every year, early registration is strongly advised to avoid disappointment. Inclusivity remains at the heart of the event, with routes designed to ensure that everyone can take part - from seasoned athletes to first-timers, families and those with additional needs.

"Last year, places sold out early, leaving many people disappointed," said project lead Mary Laxton. "We've increased capacity for 2026 to 1,200 runners, but we expect demand to be even higher."

"This run has become such an important fixture on the local calendar, not only for elite athletes but also for families, schools, youth groups and charities who use it as a way to come together and celebrate what makes Hailsham such a special community."
